up land banks, raising money for demolition through the Ohio Attorney General's Office and the "robosigning" settlement has been gratifying - to say the least.

I look forward to moving throughout the Land Conservancy's service area and "spreading the gospel" of conservation and how it can work even in urban areas.



Nine Ohio counties have established land banks

The list of Ohio counties with fully formed land banks is growing. To date, nine land banks are fully established and eligible to accept properties, according to Robin Thomas, land bank program director for Thriving Communities Institute. Those counties are Lucas, Erie, Lorain, Cuyahoga, Trumbull, Mahoning, Franklin, Montgomery and Hamilton.

Five other counties - Lake, Summit, Portage, Stark and Butler - now have legislation in the





Strategic planning workshops held in North Canton, Toledo

Counties and communities seeking some of the \$75 million in demolition funding available through Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine's Moving Ohio Forward Grant Program are required to develop a strategic plan. In order to help counties and communities develop such a plan, Thriving Communities Institute recently held workshops at Walsh University in North Canton and at the Toledo Public Library. Speakers included Jim Rokakis, executive director of Thriving Communities, Jennifer Mildren, assistant attorney general in the Mortgage Foreclosure

Unit, and Terry Schwarz, director of Kent State University's Cleveland Urban Design Collaborative. About 80 people attended. The demolition funding is available to local communities to assist in razing residential properties throughout the state. We're talking land banks with Cleveland Area Board of REALTORS

What does the existence of a county land bank do for the real estate market in a particular community, and how can a land bank help build stronger neighborhoods? These issues and others were addressed by Thriving Communities Institute Land Bank Program Director Robin Thomas when she spoke to the Cleveland Area Board of REALTORS as part of the group's Continuing Education Program. The one-hour presentation was titled, "County Land Banks and How Land Banks Impact Real Estate.

Joanne Zettl, Chairwoman-Elect of CABOR, said, "The real estate licensees learned how land banks help the real estate market, what the impact of land banks are on vacant and abandoned properties. Students were especially interested in how land banks acquire and dispose of properties. Those in attendance had a better understanding of land banks and were glad they attended."

Thriving Communities Institute offices moving to Ohio City

Thriving Communities Institute is on the move! On July 2, the Thriving Communities offices will be moving to the restored United Bank Building, which is at the corner of Lorain Avenue and West 25th Street in Cleveland's Ohio City neighborhood. The nine-story building opened in 1925 as the tallest and largest commercial building on Cleveland's West Side. It was one of the last of a series of classical bank buildings constructed in Cleveland during the 1910s and 1920s, a golden age for the city's banking industry. Q and A with Rich Cochran

Rich Cochran, president and CEO of Western Reserve Land Conservancy, was profiled in Plain Dealer reporter Grant Segall's "My Cleveland," a question-and-answer feature. We have world-class hunting and fishing: deer, duck, turkey, steelhead and walleye. People come from all over to hunt and

Rokakis tells our story to national housing panel

Jim Rokakis was one of the national housing experts chosen to speak at a Pew Charitable Trust workshop June 20-21 in Washington, D.C. The panel was convened to discuss how to restore the housing market. Jim spoke about Thriving



Communities' efforts in the area of demolition and its Clean and Green Programs. He argued that these programs are a necessary component to restoring health to the housing markets in weak-market cities. An independent nonprofit foundation, Pew is the sole beneficiary of seven individual charitable funds established between 1948 and 1979 by two sons and two daughters of Sun Oil Company founder Joseph N. Pew and his wife, Mary Anderson Pew. The assets of these trusts totaled \$4.797 billion at the end of June 2011.

How Thriving Communities was formed
