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## Big Swamp Woods preserved

The Land Conservancy, in partnership with the Cleveland Museum of Natural History Natural Areas Program, has preserved 81 acres of a 430-acre wetland complex in Fitchville Township in Huron County.

Big Swamp Woods, located in the headwaters of the Vermilion River watershed, is the largest swamp in Huron County and one of the largest forest blocks in north central Ohio. It consists of a 60-acre, high-quality wooded buttonbush swamp and swamp forest wetland complex, with water hip- or chest-deep in the spring. Walking in the swamp

has the remote feeling of being back in time – it is truly a primeval experience.

According to State Botanist Rick Gardner, Ohio has been interested in protecting Big Swamp Woods since the 1980s because of its 400-plus acres of connected forest, high quality swamp forest, buttonbush swamps, rare plants and significant amphibian communities. The state designated the area a Conservation Site and a Reference Wetland Complex, meaning it is of regional or statewide significance for its

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## He works to preserve precious wetlands

If there was ever a question of how much one person can contribute to the good of a community, one would just have to point to John Katko. Katko's work, which centers on the protection of wetlands and other habitats in northern Ohio, is legendary in the natural resource community.

**John Katko**

Katko, who taught science and math at Sheffield Middle School before his retirement in

2007, has an enthusiasm for wetlands and the natural world that is infectious to young and old alike.

"With fewer than 10 percent of our original wetlands left in Ohio, we need to dispatch the outdated and destructive attitudes of the settler days, when

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these places mainly represented an obstacle to human habitation and industry, and transform our approach to them with an enlightened and conserving view that encompasses their fabulous beauty, their biological and ecological functions, and the vital roles they play for people," he says. "There is nothing like the transformative experience of a sojourn in a wild place to unburden the heart of the terrific freight of 'civilization.'"

In 1991, Katko formed Friends of Wetlands as a response to wetlands being legislated out of existence and developments

encroaching on prime habitat for amphibians, plants and other wildlife. Katko, who holds a master's degree in botany from Kent State University, became an expert at identifying plants, especially those that are wetland indicators.

Firelands Land Conservancy formed in 1997 as a result of the networking done within FOWL. In 2006, the FLC merged with seven other organizations to form Western Reserve Land Conservancy. Katko brought to the Land Conservancy's attention several biological jewels the organization may not have otherwise been aware of, including the recently preserved 80-acre Big Swamp Woods in Huron County. He is always happy to help us out, walking properties and identifying plants and animals for biological surveys.

In 2002, Katko received a Clean Water Hero award from the Clean Water Network, a coalition group within the Natural Resources Defense Council. He has served on the board of the Ohio Environmental Council since 2006. Starting next spring, Katko will teach a general course on wetlands through the biology department at Oberlin College.

But what he really likes to do is take a walk in the woods and teach folks about wetlands, salamanders and their significance. "When the noise, odor, confusion, and anxiety of civilized surroundings start to wither my soul," he says, "there is a billboard in my brain that starts to glow: 'Got Nature?'"

And because of John Katko's work, there are now more of these special natural areas preserved.

funded by a grant from the Ohio EPA Ohio Environmental Educational Fund and Oberlin College. In 2008, 10,000 books were distributed to landowners along the river as well as schools within the watershed. Only a handful of these books remain.

Earlier this year, a very generous landowner along the Vermilion River pledged \$5,000 toward a reprint of an additional 5,000 books if we can raise the rest of the

biological diversity or ecological integrity.

The Land Conservancy and the history museum submitted a grant and received Clean Ohio funds to purchase the property. Fitchville Township Trustees, as well as the Huron County Commissioners, expressed their support for the project. The museum provided the match dollars needed, and will own and manage the property as a nature preserve and provide public access to the property by permission for educational and recreational pursuits. A dedication ceremony will take place in September.
