Grand River Partners employees Brett Rodstrom, George Warnock and Lisa Pasquale, who are based in GRP's Painesville office, are joining the Land Conservancy staff. The Painesville location, which is at 70 South Park Place, will become a Land Conservancy field office.

Rodstrom, GRP's land protection coordinator, was a storm water specialist with Lake Soil and Water Conservation District before joining

GRP. Rodstrom, who holds a degree in environmental science from Allegheny College, said it is "exciting to be a part of the marriage of two of the most successful private conservation organization in Northeast Ohio."

Warnock's lifelong passion for environmental issues led him to Lake Erie College, where in he graduated with a degree in environmental

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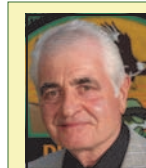

He's an ardent advocate for the farming community

Dominic Marchese is a champion for the preservation of farms.

Marchese, who has owned and operated Manna Farms in Farmdale for 35 years, currently sits on the Ohio Wildlife Council as a representative of the farming community. He raises grass-fed Piedmontese cattle, a breed from Italy that provides low-fat, low-calorie

beef.

In addition, Marchese is a member of the Land Conservancy's Eastern Advisory Committee, which helps shape land conservation efforts in

Trumbull, Mahoning and Ashtabula counties.

"They are not making any more land," he said. "If you don't act to preserve it, it will be lost forever. I think it's important to preserve something that's freely given. We really don't own anything, anyway. We just use it."

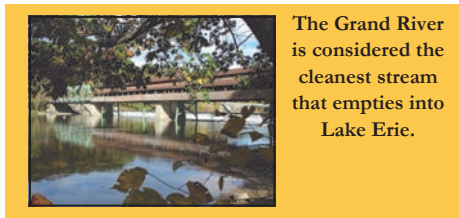
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GRP, Land Conservancy to merge

Members of Grand River Partners have unanimously endorsed an agreement to merge with Western Reserve Land Conservancy. The voice vote took place at an Aug. 31 membership meeting at The Winery at Spring Hill in Geneva.

The merger, which is expected to become official in November, joins northern Ohio's two largest land conservancies.

"We are humbled to have the opportunity to integrate Grand River Partners' land conservation portfolio into our stewardship program, and we are very excited to merge their staff and office into our operation," said Rich Cochran, president and CEO of

Western Reserve Land Conservancy. "This will lead to more land protected more quickly. It is an example of the power of multiplication: While five plus five equals 10, we all know that five times five equals 25. Before this merger, we were engaged in addition, where our work and GRP's work produced incremental gains. The merger will produce a trans-

forming multiplication effect that will result in greater mission accomplishment."

Grand River Partners' office in Painesville will become a Western Reserve Land Conservancy field office staffed by three full-time employees who have been working for GRP.

The Land Conservancy has preserved 251 properties and 15,390 acres.

Grand River Partners, which was formed in 1994, currently holds or co-holds 33 conservation easements and owns eight preserves in the watershed for a total of almost 3,700 acres of permanently protected land.

Spotlight

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The former Warren Fire Department lieutenant – he worked there as a firefighter from 1966 to 1991 – is also active in the Trumbull County Farm Bureau and has served on the bureau's Board of Trustees. In addition, Marchese is currently a Johnston Township trustee.

Marchese, a U.S. Navy veteran, said it is important to have in place mechanisms such as agricultural and conservation easements.

It is equally important, he said, to have land conservancies and other groups willing to make sure the easement grantor's wishes are followed.

"Somebody has to make the bold move to dictate something that will remain just as they have planned," Marchese said. "It's all about conserving and protecting the land for future generations."

For example, the average steelhead fisherman in Northeast Ohio spends more than \$40 per fishing trip, and the industry brings in \$12 million to \$14 million per year to the state, according to an Ohio State University study. Lake Erie's recreation offerings and the region's world-class whitetail deer-hunting also generate significant tourism revenue. Preserving these special places is vital to the region's economic future.
