Pianist strikes note for conservation

A Cleveland-based concert pianist who has performed all over the world has preserved an oasis close to home.

Jean Stell, a noted pianist, teacher and founding board member of the Rocky River Chamber Music Society, has granted Western Reserve Land Conservancy an easement that will permanently protect her 78-acre, heavily wooded plot in Ashland County.

Stell and her late husband, Ed, purchased the property in the late 1970s for a vacation home. Two years ago, Jean Stell approached the Land Conservancy in an effort to learn what con-

serva- tion options were available. It led to the agreement this year.

“We want to extend our gratitude to Jean Stell for her contribu-

tion to preserving Ohio’s natural beauty,” said Andy McDowell, field director for the Land Conservancy’s Firelands Field Office.

Stell has a beautiful vacation home on the property in Ruggles Township. Younger forests there boast red maples in abundance, whereas the property’s more mature wooded areas include elm, red oak,

best.”

Fabis, who earned a bachelor’s degree in environmental studies with a minor in geology, spent one term studying ecology and conservation at the School for International Training in Botswana.

Her internships included Project Vote Smart in Montana, the American Farmland Trust in Washington D.C. and George Jones Organic Farm/City Fresh.

She also taught creative writing at Oberlin for a term, worked as a copy editor for

The Oberlin Review newspaper and had an article on bird conservation published in the journal *Birdlife Botswana*.

Fabis did several college research projects of concern to the Land Conservancy.

Studying riparian buffer policy, she made policy recommendations to township trustees of the Black River Watershed. Using geographical survey data, she mapped agricultural infrastructure in the Firelands region. This infrastructure of supplies and services is critical to the future of farming in our region.

“Liz has performed invaluable services for our office and we will miss her very much,” Pilacky said.

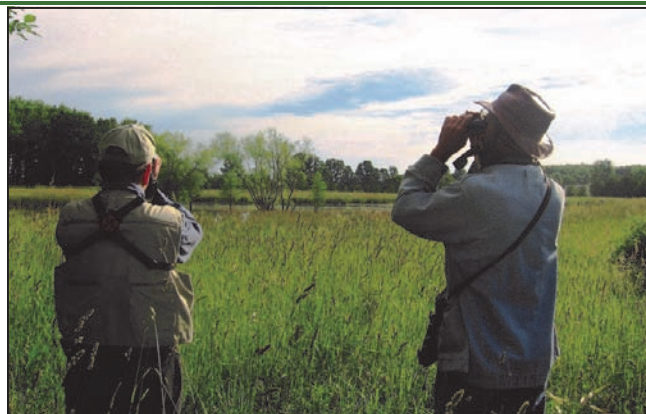
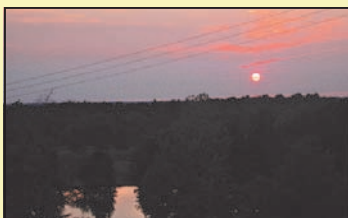
